The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the charity commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

The main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objectives during this period were:

- Fundraising for, planning and delivering the annual summer residential course which brings together a diverse group of young musicians aged 11-18 from across England.
- Delivery of a workshop in partnership with the Academy of Saint Martin in the Fields.
- Sectional and small ensemble activity including performances at Westminster Abbey, the Royal Bank of Scotland, the National Gallery, and the East London Academy of Music.
- Planning and delivering the launch of the Conductors for Change programme at the annual South Bank Sounds Venezuela Festival.
- Building relationships with new funding partners including Youth Music and ACE.
- Planning and delivering a 2-day workshop in partnership with Tomorrow's Warriors and culminating in a performance at The Royal Academy of Music.
- Regional and national school modulo workshops and performances as part of the in-school Conductors for Change programme.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year The main preoccupations and achievements during the period under report were establishing systems and procedures; formulating a strategy and an associated business plan; fundraising from a range of sources; continuing to build partnerships with educational and artistic organisations; planning and delivering the *Conductors for Change* programme with both the launch and culmination of the programme taking place at the South Bank Sounds Venezuela Festival; and planning and delivering the annual summer residential course in conjunction with the Teach First Summer Institute at the University of Warwick.

Financial review

Brief statement of the charity's policy on reserves

Orchestras for All Trustees have agreed that the charity should hold financial reserves because it is entirely dependent for income upon donor funding from year to year which is inevitably subject to fluctuation and requires protected funds to cover insurance claims, accommodation costs, and staff notice fees in the event of its demise.

The trustees believe that the minimum level of the financial reserves should allow for making multiple insurance claims, one month's notice fees for all staff on the PAYE payroll, and office accommodation commitments.

With an initial transfer of £1,000, monthly payments of £500 are being transferred to a financial reserves account and will continue until £8,500 has been secured. The financial reserves currently stand at £2,000.

This policy is to be reviewed at six month intervals, and after the recruitment of new staff members to allow for additional notice fees.
